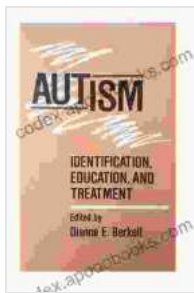


Autism Spectrum Disorders: Identification, Education, and Treatment

Identification

Treatment

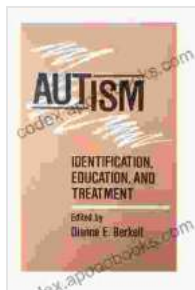

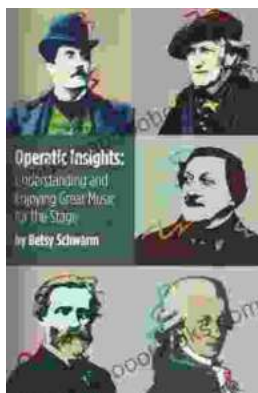
