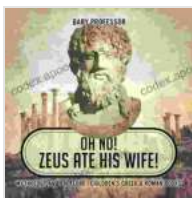

HISTORY OF THE GREEK GODS

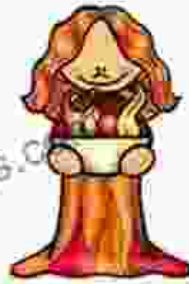

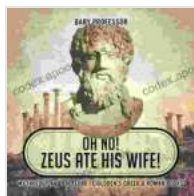
