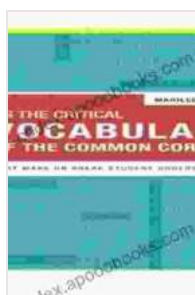

There are a number of effective strategies for teaching critical vocabulary to students.

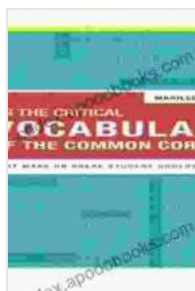
